



Traveling with Your Pet

Road trips with your pets can be a lot of fun! While planning a trip for you and your pet you'll want to find pet-friendly places to visit and stay. Car trips can also be potentially hazardous to your pet. Not securing your pet while traveling can be problematic. A sudden stop or accident can send your pet flying. Also a loose pet in a car could escape by jumping out of an open door before you have them secured. To avoid this, you can purchase a harness for dogs that connect to the seatbelt and the cat-carrier can be secured to the back seat with a seatbelt.



Many dogs and cats do not travel well in a car. Consider speaking with your vet about tranquilizers and motion-sickness pills.

Leaving your pets in a hot car is dangerous as they could suffer a heatstroke. With their fur coat and inability to sweat, your pet could be overcome with heat quicker than you may have thought.

If you must leave your pet in the vehicle for a short amount of time, leave at least two windows open slightly to provide a cross draft of fresh air. You might consider a solar powered fan that will fit in the window. However, we strongly recommend that you DO NOT leave animals in the car in hot climates or during the warmer months as even a short time in a hot vehicle can be injurious to your pet.

It is also a good idea to have access to your pet's vaccine and medical records while you travel. If you will be on a plane, train, bus, or boat, check with the service company what their requirements are for pet travel. Rabies vaccinations are a must for all travel abroad and returning to the United States. Depending on where you're traveling you may need more documents.
